Daniel Bradley settled in Haverhill Mass
May 21 1662 married Mary dau of John Willens
and had four children

His son Abraham Bradley came to Rumford
now Concord N.H. about 1720

He was b. Mar. 14 1683 d. about 1754

Their third child; Timothy Bradley (Lieut) b. 1711
married Abrah Stevens and had ten children
Their third child Timothy Jr. b. Oct 18 1743
died July 31 1811

He married Sarah Foster and had
eight children. Their sixth child
was also Timothy Bradley 3rd and
their youngest son
His brother Abial b. May 6 1790 also
came with him ^{to Canterbury} & settled on the same or
adjoining farm. (?)

Bradleys of Canterbury Borough

Timothy Bradley³ son of Timothy Jr & Sarah Foster came from Concord ("Mountain") to Canterbury about 1822. Their two youngest children were born there.

He was born Jan 24 1786 & died Sept 20 1837. They were Methodist people and he was killed at a camp meeting by a tent pole falling on him.

His wife was Anna dau of Dea. Laban Marvell born Feb. 22 1792 & died Feb. 6 1854. They are buried at the Centre Cemetery.

Asa Foster the eldest son; in 1842 was
assistant County Surveyor and had for his
assistant his younger brother, Timothy Markum Bradley.
He and later removed to Illinois and died at
Jefferson Feb. 26 1892

He was four times married and had ten
children

Louisa Bradley married Nathan Emery and
spent her whole life in C. They had ⁽³⁾ children

Peter M. Bradley was a **farmer** all his
life, on his fathers farm at first and later
on Marston Hill East Andover and following
his brothers to Illinois settled at Arlington
Height where he died in 1891. He had an in-
born love for the soil and was a great
lover of trees. His first care on settling on the
prairie was to plant orchards & groves,
which still stand as his monuments

They had four children all born in Canterbury
two of whom Mrs Emily Ellen Draper and
Timothy Forrest Bradley still reside at
Arlington Heights.

The farmer was a graduate of
Wheaton College in 1864. was for some years
a teacher and married Daniel K Draper of
Amherst Mass Mt Clemens Mich. June 1865.

His grandfather was pastor many years of
the Congregational Church of Amherst Mass.

He was a soldier in the Civil war
and held many offices of trust and responsibility.

They have one son Cyrus Draper of Arling-
ton Heights.

Timothy Forrest Bradley is a farmer
at Arlington Heights.

He has long been en-
gaged in stock raising - especially the
breeding of fine horses - and has
owned several noted imported horses &
was the first to introduce the Pichon
draft horse into his neighborhood.

He has five children.

Cyrus Parker Bradley, ^{the 5th child} went from
Canterbury to Chicago ~~with~~ ⁱⁿ as all his brothers
had done, during the Spring of 1837.

Lith Eastman Bradley was for the times ⁵
liberally educated and was a teacher
some years in Canterbury. Married 1st
Hannah Hall Forrest & 2nd Clarissa Chase

David Merrill Bradley went in 1837 to Chicago with Horace John Westworth (Long John) and was associated with him for twenty years in the publication of the Chicago "Democrat" and Chicago then had only 2000 inhabitants. He married Eliza Ann Emery and had six children, one of whom David Emery Bradley graduated at Dartmouth College in 1863(?) and taught the previous winter in the Borough Dist school where his father had been a pupil.

Afterward his mother's death he returned
to Chicago and was clerk to his brother
Cyrus who was sheriff of Cook Co.
and later filled that office.

He was cashier of the U. S. Sub. Treasury
during two administrations - also County Com.
and Supervisor of Lake view. He was for forty
years investor in Lake View lands and
made a fortune by the rise of land alone.

He was fond of yachting and was com-
mander of the Chicago Yacht-club. He was a
32nd Degree Mason for more than twenty years.

He belonged to Lincoln Park Lodge Cornithian
Chapter No. 69: Apollo Commandery and As he
nearly the close of life his greatest desire
was to leave to his family a certificate of his
membership in the Oriental Consistory of Chicago.
It was accomplished during the last week of his life.

Timothy Mathew. The youngest son (Bradley says &
~~Cyrus Parker~~ Bradley, went west on his
brother David's invitation and became a pupil
at Michigan City academy Ind. In 1849 or so he
went overland to the gold fields of Cal. to
seek his fortune. The journey lasted six months
was eventful and dangerous - was captured
by Indians and tied to a tree to be burned when
he was unexpectedly rescued. He was called
home by the sickness and took a sailing
vessel to Panama. crossed the isthmus on
