

Milford Mass July 31/10

My dear Mr. Lyford; I have yours enclosing reference to Capt. Asa's diary and Daniel Foster's service in the French & Indian war. I think what you have said is excellent and fits the case. It is satisfactory and I thank you for the extract.

Referring to your letter of the 26th and to Miss Doughty's corrections in red ink on the Bradleys as shown by the Foster genealogy, I can only say that my information was taken from Pierson's genealogy of the Fosters, and I have found this substantially correct with the exception of occasional errors in dates. Therefore I think her corrections on dates may be justified and I have no reason to comment to the contrary. However, I notice that she says John J. Bradley's records do not give Sarah Foster as the wife of Timothy Bradley Jr. and here I want to offer further evidence that she was his wife, by asking you to refer to pages 30 and 33 of the Foster

genealogy and take note that the wives
of Adams Foster and David M. Foster were
grand daughters of Sarah Foster and Timothy
Bradley and their names were Sarah
Bradley Eastman and Sarah Bradley Robertson.

I should say John J. Bradley's records were
incomplete in this respect of not giving
Sarah Foster as the wife of Timothy Bradley Jr.

I am having the Chamberlain matter
copied for you out of the Foster genealogy
and will send it in a few days. There is
several pages of it and I would have sent
it long before this but I knew you was
in correspondence with Paul Mellen Chamberlain
and thought sure he would furnish you with
all facts. The connection of the Chamberlains
comes through Polly, daughter of Abiel Foster Jr.
as the wife of Moses Chamberlain of London
See Foster genealogy page 25. You will remember
it was Moses Chamberlain who bought the
Rev. Abiel Foster homestead from Abiel Jr. Sept. 5, 1836.
I think the track place is about right for the

location of Rev. Abel's homestead and I was inclined to this view when you were here. If we could begin with Truch and trace the ownership back by the deeds at Concord it would add certainty to the tradition. I have great confidence in these deed records as final evidence.
